



## Your Information Rights

The law requires us to hold your information. This may include details of the offence(s) you have been charged with, your personal circumstances, next of kin and risk management plan. We will not share your information outside of Probation unless you agree; or the law requires us to do so; or the law allows it and we believe it is important to do so.

You have a right to access your information, amend your personal information if it is incorrect, to request that we cease to process your information in some limited circumstances and that we destroy your information in line with our Retention and Disposal Schedule.

For more details on how we process your information, ask your Probation Officer about the **“Privacy Notice for those having Pre-Sentence Reports (Magistrates Court Report or Crown Court Report) compiled”** leaflet. You should also be given this by the Probation Officer.



## Retaining & Holding Your Information

We will only retain your information for as long as necessary and for the purposes we have described. Your Information will be held in accordance with our Retention and Disposal Schedule which is available on our website at [www.pbni.org.uk](http://www.pbni.org.uk).

# Pre-Sentence Report for Court

This leaflet will explain to you what a Pre-Sentence Report is, how the report is written and why it is needed.



## What is a Pre-Sentence Report?

If you have been convicted of an offence at court, a Probation Officer will write information about you in a report for the Court. This report is called a Pre-Sentence Report or a PSR. The report is used to assist the Court in deciding what the sentence will be in your case. The contents of the report will normally be shared with you to check its factual accuracy.



## How is the Pre-Sentence Report written?

You will have at least one interview with a Probation Officer, and a visit to your home may be carried out. The interview may take place in a Probation Office or by phone or WhatsApp and if you are in custody it will take place by videolink. A Probation Officer will arrange a time to interview you. If you are under 18 years old your parents or guardians will be with you. You must let us know if you cannot make it to the interview by telephoning us in advance. If you don't attend or turn up late, the Probation Officer will have to tell the Court if you do not turn up and a report cannot be written.

On first contact with you, the Probation Officer will also take you through filling out an Equality Monitoring form.



## What is involved?

A Pre-Sentence Report will be written about you by a Probation Officer. Your Probation Officer will meet with you and you should be open and honest in your discussions. The Judge will want to know as much as possible about you and your situation.



### The Court will also want to know:

- What you think about what you did, what you think about the victims of your offence(s) and what you think you need to do to repair the harm caused by your offending.
- Other offences for which you have been convicted.
- What the Probation Officer's assessment is regarding the risk of you offending in the future.

To get all of the information for the report the Probation Officer may have to talk to other people who know you. They will tell you who they will need to talk to and get your permission to contact them. This might include members of your family, your GP or another organisations that you are working with such as addiction services.



## What is expected of you?

We will treat you with respect and courtesy and will expect the same from you.

The Pre-sentence report is important and we expect you to attend for interview without being under the influence of alcohol or drugs.

We expect you to behave respectfully to Probation staff and other people using our offices. If you behave in a way that is verbally or physically aggressive we will ask you to leave and we may not be able to write your report.



## Who sees the PSR?

A number of people will read your Pre-Sentence Report. This is to make sure everyone involved has the information they need.



## What will be the outcome?

The Judge will be given the Pre-Sentence Report from Probation, along with reports from other individuals or organisations, in order to decide the sentence you will be given. If you are given a community sentence, your sentence will be supervised by a Probation Officer. More information about your sentence will be given to you by your Probation Officer if you receive a community sentence.
